

Who are you & when did you graduate with SIP?

Nicola Woolvine, I graduated in 2019.

What was your route into teacher training?

I gained my degree (Law LLB) in 1995 and went on to work for many years as a self-employed adult educator.

I taught courses throughout Hampshire for charities, job centres and children's centres. I also worked for a year as a Learning Support Assistant at a local Sixth Form College.

Throughout this time and whilst raising my 3 children I also studied further and gained a number of Diplomas. As my children became more independent I took the decision to do my teacher training and after having spent some time visiting local Special Schools decided that I wanted to specialise in SEN.

Where have you worked since graduating and in what position?

Since graduating I have been working as a class teacher at Rosewood Free School which is a school for pupils aged 2-19 years with profound and multiple learning difficulties (PMLD). I am now embarking on a further degree which will give me Specialist Teacher status: **PGDip - Mandatory Qualification for Teachers of Children and Young People with Multi-sensory Impairment.**

Why did you choose to study with us?

Having made the decision to do my teacher training I went along to a 'Get into Teaching' evening at the Novotel Hotel in Southampton. It was at this event that I met Janina and her colleague from **SIP** and became inspired. We chatted and I had one of those 'light bulb' moments! I went on to visit a number of local Special Schools and decided that this was what I had been looking for and what I was meant to do!

What 3 things would you recommend about SIP?

Great support from everyone at **SIP**. There was always someone to call upon for support or advice.

It was a small group of fellow trainees and so we could get to know each other really well and form a wonderful support network.

The quality of the training we received weekly was brilliant. Specific, current, relevant and focussed.



What advice would you give to a new trainee?

Make sure you have the time and mental space to commit to such an intense year. I had to wait until my children were a little more independent before I could.

Start organised and remain that way. Different folders for different things and have a space where you can store all of your paperwork.

Form a WhatsApp group with the fellow trainees as soon as possible. They will become your friends and an invaluable source of support.

What is your favourite memory of your training year?

Meeting my group of peers every Friday. We shared how our weeks had been and offered and received advice. I have remained in contact with my group and have been out socially with them since we graduated. It is always great to hear how they are doing and share stories.

Would you like to share any other thoughts?

Training with **SIP** was one of the best decisions I have ever made. It has given me a career which I absolutely love. The children I get to teach are precious and the families I work with are amazing.
